# **COURSE OVERVIEW**

### **Course description**

Through the Internet, TV, tabloids, and pop-psychology books, we are barraged with pseudoscientific and paranormal claims of extraordinary abilities (e.g., telepathy, telekinesis, fortune telling, etc.), paranormal activity (e.g., existence of ghosts, cryptozoology, alien abduction, near death experiences, etc.), and nonscientific claims (e.g., facilitated communication, anti-vaccination movement, creation sciences, etc.).

The field of psychology has much to say about why so many of us believe in such incredible phenomena. The more we learn about the capabilities of the brain, the more we learn that our reasoning processes are fallible. We see patterns where none exist, we seek to confirm beliefs we already hold, and we value vivid experiences over statistical information.

The goal of the course is to gain an understanding of normal errors in thinking and logic and to learn how to critically analyze claims through scientific reasoning and logical treatment of evidence.

#### **Course Goals**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand the characteristics of pseudoscience
- Understand the basics of logical argument and the basics of the scientific method
- Describe errors in logic and errors in thinking as a toolkit for assessing claims

- Understand how the human mind makes errors in reason and perception
- Assess and critically analyze various claims
- Differentiate between scientific and pseudoscientific claims

# **HOW THIS COURSE WORKS**

**Mode of delivery:** This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

**Pace of online activities:** This course is divided into **weekly modules**. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

**Credit hours and work expectations:** This is a **3-credit-hour course**. According to <u>Ohio</u> <u>State policy</u>, students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of everyone's expected participation:

- **Participating in online activities for attendance**: **AT LEAST ONCE PER WEEK** You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. (During most weeks you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me *as soon as possible*.
- Office hours and live sessions: OPTIONAL All live, scheduled events for the course, including my office hours, are optional.
- **Participating in discussion forums**: **MOST WEEKS** As part of your participation, many weeks have a required discussion. Discussions ask you to apply or think differently about a topic from the week's content. Be sure to read the instructions for each discussion carefully before submitting your post!

- **Backing up your work**: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
