The Heritage of Hannah Neil is a treatment component of Eastway Behavioral Healthcare of Dayton, Ohio. There are two centers in Columbus. The Reeb Avenue Center office provides community based outpatient services and

linkage with nine other provider agencies located in the Reeb Avenue Center. The Heritage of Hannah Neil provides a wide continuum of mental health and behavioral health program services directly or through collaborations. The community based program offers in home, in school, in community and office based outpatient services for children, adolescents and adults. The Day Treatment program provides mental health and behavioral health services coupled with full classroom therapeutic education learning for children ages 6-17.
